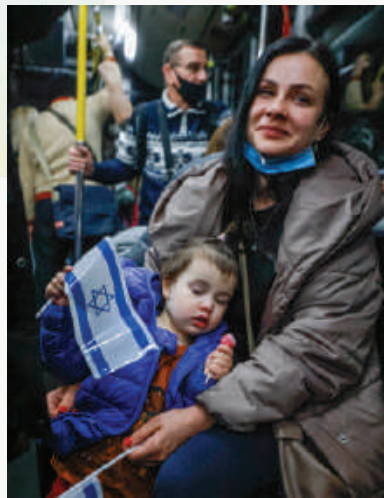


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Mission

The Associated's priorities remain to care for each other and to advance Jewish life and learning – both locally and globally. As we move into FY24, Israel and Overseas is now called **Israel and Global Initiatives (I&G)** to reflect our commitment to the global Jewish community.

In an ever-changing world, these ideals remain as important as ever. While we were able to return to a sense of normalcy post-COVID, we are reminded every day through global events that Jewish communities at home and around the world continue to need our support. In FY23, we marked the one-year anniversary of the war in Ukraine, where our friends in Odesa continue to persevere in the face of an unprecedented humanitarian crisis. The Associated, through our Ukraine Emergency Fund and Baltimore-Odesa Partnership, supported Ukraine through the work of our overseas partners, including the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI) and World ORT.

FY23 was a milestone year for Israel here in Baltimore. We celebrated Israel's 75th birthday with community members in partnership with our new community *shlichah* the Baltimore Jewish Council, the JCC, Jewish Educational Services, the MIDC and Pearlstone. Hundreds of Baltimoreans traveled to Israel to visit our partner community of Ashkelon. This included our second Keshet (Connections) cohort, whose participants built deep, meaningful connections between Baltimore and Ashkelon. The Associated's Insight Israel Forum served as a resource for community leaders, including providing a space to learn more about the judicial reform conversations taking place in Israel.

FY24 will continue with milestones, as we will celebrate 20 years of the Baltimore-Ashkelon Partnership and the 5th year of the Insight Israel Forum. Our delegation of *shlichim* (Israeli emissaries) continues to grow, as we will welcome back our community *shlichah* for a second year, a new *shaliach* at Pearlstone, and eight new *Shinshinim* (young pre-army Israeli emissaries).

We are thrilled to begin our roles as the new Co-chairs of Israel & Global Initiatives and look forward to continuing to support the global Jewish community, including our partner cities of Ashkelon, Israel and Odesa, Ukraine.

We look forward to seeing you at The Associated's exceptional programming in the year ahead.

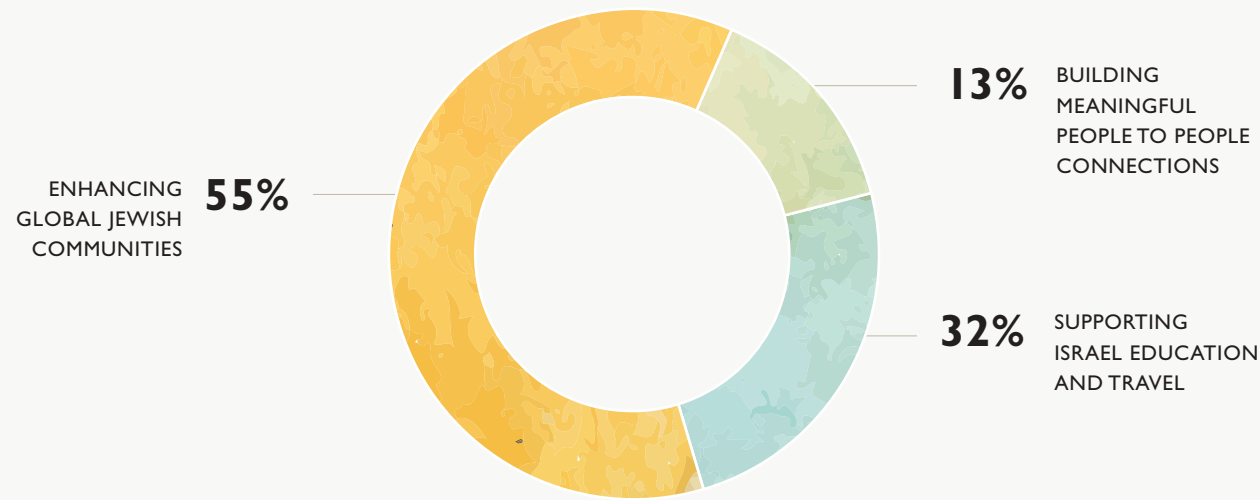
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I&G FY24 OVERVIEW

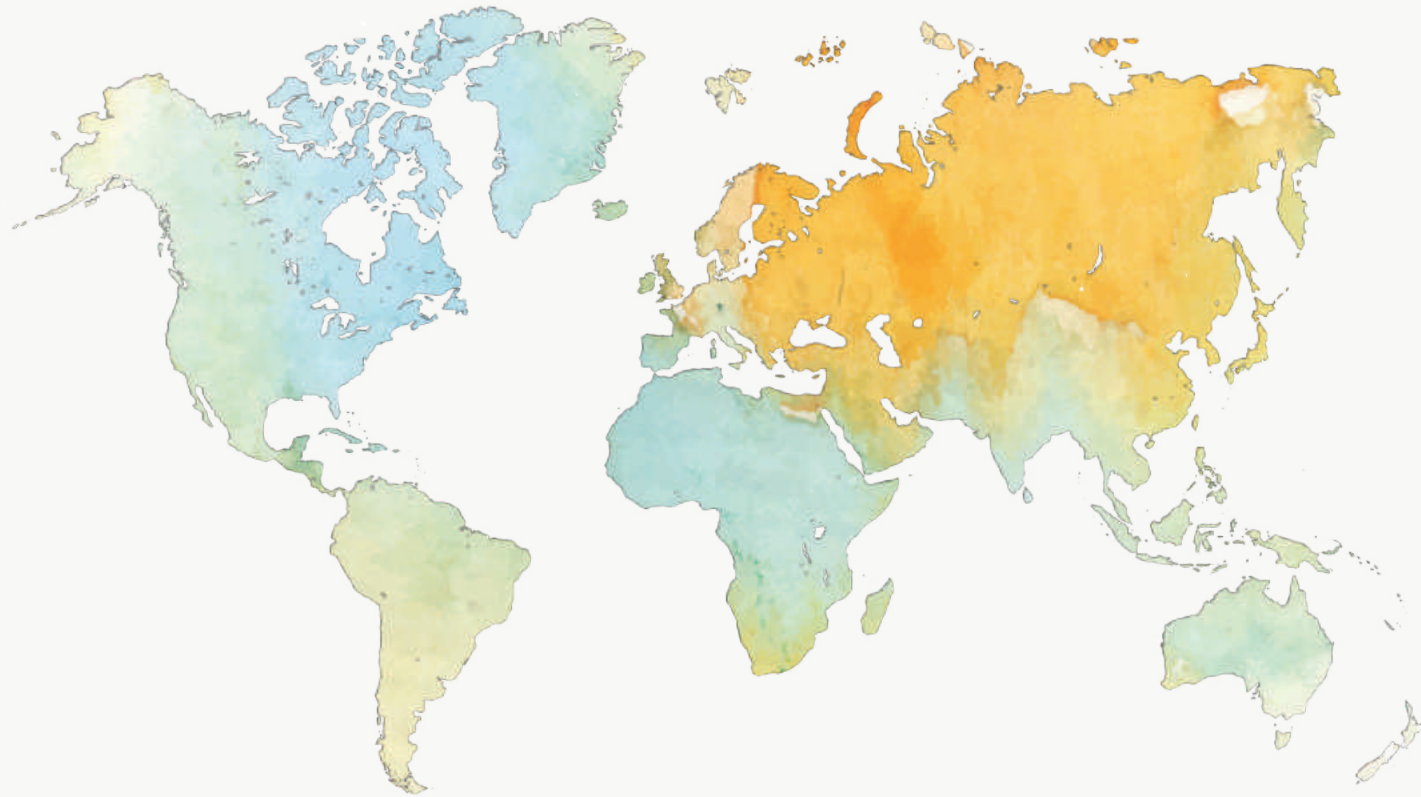

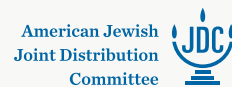

HISTORIC GLOBAL PARTNERS

Working together in good times and in crisis in our global work are The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI) and World ORT. These organizations ensure every Jew in over 70 countries around the world receives the assistance they need, builds a strong Israel, and Jews living outside of Israel and Israelis are connected. The Associated is proud to provide our global partners with unrestricted grants annually, in addition to designated program grants, to support vital work of these organizations.



American Joint Distribution Committee (JDC) – JDC is the leading Jewish humanitarian organization, working in 70 countries to lift lives and strengthen communities. JDC rescues Jews in danger, provides aid to vulnerable Jews, develops innovative solutions to Israel's most complex social challenges, cultivates a Jewish future and leads the Jewish community's response to crises.



The Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI) – The Jewish Agency for Israel connects the global Jewish family, bringing Jews to Israel, and Israel to Jews, by providing meaningful Israel engagement and facilitating Aliyah. They work to build a better society in Israel – and beyond – energizing young Israelis and their worldwide peers to rediscover a collective sense of Jewish purpose.



World ORT – World ORT is the world's largest Jewish education and vocational training NGO (Non-Governmental Organization). Over 135 years, they have educated and trained people in over 100 countries to build economic self-sufficiency for communities.



THE ASSOCIATED'S INSIGHT ISRAEL FORUM identifies and facilitates opportunities for the Baltimore Jewish community leadership to deepen and enhance our connection with Israel and strengthen our ability to have respectful discourse.

KESHER

Kesher (Connections) is a program funded through The Associated's Baltimore-Ashkelon Partnership. It is designed for adults ages 45+ interested in establishing meaningful relationships and a greater understanding of their sense of Jewish peoplehood by building a living bridge between the partner cities of Baltimore and Ashkelon. Participants meet in person and virtually to deepen their understanding between the two communities and foster a stronger Jewish identity and connection. The program culminates with a home hospitality experience in both Baltimore and Ashkelon where participants have the opportunity to be completely immersed in each other's communities. The most recent Kesher cohort concluded in August 2023.

BUILDING MEANINGFUL PEOPLE-TO-PEOPLE CONNECTIONS

Through our partnerships with Ashkelon, Israel and Odesa, Ukraine, as well as the *shlichim* (Israeli emissaries) living in the Baltimore community, we create opportunities for life-changing experiences and relationships to bring our global Jewish community closer together on a personal level.

I&G GRANTMAKING

Community Planning and Allocations (CP&A) is the arm of the Associated that weaves together the vital work of our local agency network and the global system to achieve The Associated's mandate to strengthen and nurture Jewish life. Through the careful stewardship of the CP&A Israel and Global committees and support of the Jewish Life Lead Team, Associated Annual Campaign funds are allocated to care for those in need around the world and to foster personal connections to Israel and the global Jewish community.

Growing Connections in Ashkelon

Ashkelon Lacrosse Club **\$10,000**
Israel Lacrosse Association

The Ashkelon Lacrosse Club uses the sport of lacrosse to teach life skills and English to youth in Ashkelon.

Baltimore-Ashkelon Youth Initiative **\$4,400**
Elijah Cummings Youth Program in Israel (ECYP)

During the summer of 2023, the teen participants of the Elijah Cummings Youth program will spend a weekend in Ashkelon building relationships with their Ashkelon peers through home hospitality and group activities.

Diller Teen Fellows **\$104,500**
Diller Teen Fellows/JCC of Greater Baltimore/Baltimore-Ashkelon Partnership

Diller Teen Fellows is a one-year immersive leadership program inviting a select group of teens to step up, lead their communities and repair the world. The funds support Diller cohorts in Ashkelon and Baltimore.

Extended Atudot **\$10,000**
Baltimore-Ashkelon Partnership

Through the Extended Atudot program, *Shinshinim* (Israel emissaries) candidates from Ashkelon will start building relationships within the Partnership and learn effective skills to enhance their preparations for the interview process.

HaZamir Ashkelon **\$10,000**

HaZamir: The International Jewish Teen Choir

HaZamir Ashkelon helps teens develop confidence and leadership skills through choral singing and connects teens from several different Ashkelon secular and religious schools. Over the past seven years, HaZamir has created lasting, close connections between singers in Ashkelon and in Baltimore as they spend intense time together rehearsing and performing during the International Festival.

Israel Connect 4.0 **\$12,000**

Edward A. Myerberg Center/Israel Connect

Through the Israel Connect program, in partnership with the Edward A. Myerberg Center, older adults in Baltimore work with high school students in Ashkelon to help them improve their English fluency. Pairs of Baltimore volunteers and Ashkelon students meet weekly by video conference to speak English and learn together about Israel and their Jewish heritage.

Momentum Day in Ashkelon **\$6,380**

Macks Center for Jewish Connections

The Macks Center for Jewish Connections (MCJC), in partnership with Momentum, is bringing 20 mothers from Baltimore to Israel for an 8-day experience in November 2023. This trip will also include 4 Ashkelonian mothers. Participants will spend one day in Ashkelon as part of the larger 8-day Israel experience and will provide the opportunity for the Baltimore women to visit the hometown of their Israeli counterparts, as well as visit Associated funded programs to understand the impact of their investment in Ashkelon.

Shevet Achim **\$37,100**

Jewish Educational Services (JES)/Municipality of Ashkelon

Shevet Achim is a two-year innovative school twinning project that cultivates direct relationships between students and teachers in 3 schools in Baltimore and 3 schools in Ashkelon. Educators collaboratively envision and implement engaging and creative educational experiences to foster meaningful relationships between learning communities in both cities.

TALMA: The Baltimore-Ashkelon Partnership **\$17,505**

TALMA: The Israel Program for Excellence in English/Municipality of Ashkelon

TALMA brings Israeli & non-Israeli teachers together to co-teach English in elementary schools during July. Due to a lack of 600+ English teachers in Israel, TALMA has become an important accelerator, enabling students from low-income communities to advance in their studies of English, regardless of financial background. This specific program matches teachers from schools in and around Baltimore to work in classrooms in Ashkelon while living in the community.

Shlichim (Israeli Emissaries)

Community Shlichah **\$84,000**

Jewish Educational Services (JES)/The Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI)/Macks Center for Jewish Connections

The Baltimore Jewish community will welcome back a *Shaliach* (Israel emissary) for a second year at Jewish Educational Services (JES) and the Macks Center for Jewish Connections to inspire a love for and connections to Israel through education. The shlichah will shape the Israel strategy at JES and MCJC, collaborate with the delegation of *shinshinim* (Hebrew acronym for *Shenat Sherut* (שנת שירות), meaning Year of Service) and serve as a resource for Israel education.

Pearlstone Shaliach **\$80,000**

Pearlstone Center/The Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI)

The *Shaliach* (emissary) engages members of our Jewish community by integrating Israel content into Pearlstone’s Jewish Outdoor Food & Environmental Education (JOFE) programming and creating a safe space for meaningful Israel dialogues across differing perspectives.

Shinshinim **\$252,000**

Jewish Educational Services (JES)/The Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI)

Building on over ten years of success, eight 18-year-olds from Israel live and volunteer in Baltimore for a year, providing a personal and nuanced perspective of Israel in over fifteen formal and informal educational settings.



SUPPORTING ISRAEL EDUCATION & TRAVEL

Our community’s connection and understanding of Israel is deepened through the opportunities provided each year to travel to Israel or to learn more about Israel right here in Baltimore, truly bringing Israel to life for our community.

Baltimore Israel Coalition **\$5,000**

Baltimore Jewish Council (BJC)

The Baltimore Israel Coalition is a consortium of organizations in the greater Baltimore area working to support Israel through education, advocacy and community building.

Birthright Israel **\$200,000**

Birthright Israel Foundation

This funding enables young adults from Baltimore, ages 18-26, to participate in a 10-day Birthright Israel experience. Participants from Baltimore spend their time exploring the cultural, historical, and religious sites in the country, as well as spending a day in Baltimore’s partner city, Ashkelon.

Community Fund for Israel Experiences **\$110,000**

Jewish Educational Services (JES)

The Community Fund for Israel Experiences (CFIE) provides scholarships to high-school and first year post-high school students who are residents of Baltimore City or Baltimore County to ensure they have the opportunity to visit and study in Israel as a way to enhance and grow Jewish identity.

Israel Engagement on Campus **\$310,000**

Goucher, Hopkins, Maryland, Towson, and UMBC Hillels

A cadre of campus Israel educators are a key part of the Hillel team on each of these five college campuses who work to strengthen students’ unique and nuanced connections with Israel.

MASA **\$140,000**

Masa Israel Journey/The Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI)

Masa Israel Journey connects young Jewish adults, ages 18-30, to over 200 gap year, study abroad, post-college and volunteer programs in Israel. Participants live and work in Israel on 2-10-month programs, where they are encouraged and supported to strive towards their personal and/or professional destination.

Onward Israel **\$40,000**

Onward Israel/The Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI)

Onward Israel is a personalized, immersive summer internship program that provides real-life work experience for college students and recent college graduates from Baltimore ready to live and learn like a local in the heart of Tel Aviv.

ENHANCING AND CONNECTING GLOBAL JEWISH COMMUNITIES

Caring for all Jews, including those in Israel and around the world, is a core value of The Associated. By learning about the challenges facing overseas communities and those in need in Israel, we can help meet these needs and strengthen *klal yisrael* (the Jewish people).

Providing Support & Building Community in Ashkelon

AMEN Teen Volunteers **\$30,000**
Municipality of Ashkelon

The AMEN Teen Volunteers project, which has received numerous national prizes in Israel, has made a significant impact in Ashkelon, supporting over 7,300 teens volunteering in Ashkelon on a weekly basis. Volunteer projects have included painting shelters, delivering food to the homebound, and environmental projects.

Music and Dance Classes at the Barnea Ethiopian Absorption Center **\$13,000**
Jewish Agency for Israel

The goal of the Music and Dance Class Program at the Barnea Absorption Center is to ease the immigration and absorption process through the powerful tools of music and dance. A strong emphasis is placed on preserving the children's roots to their Ethiopian culture and classes will take place in the newly renovated Music Room, funded by the Baltimore-Ashkelon Partnership.

Providing Immediate Assistance to Holocaust Survivors in Need in Ashkelon **\$10,000**
The Foundation for the Welfare of Holocaust Victims

This program will address the basic daily needs of 5,000 underprivileged Holocaust survivors in Ashkelon. The project includes a number of services, free of charge for survivors, and ensures a quick response when issues arise. These include: subsidizing dental treatments, performing accessibility enhancement adjustments in survivors' apartments, providing vision tests and eyeglasses and other immediate needs such as medical and para-medical equipment, basic home appliances and ambulance evacuation.

SHEF-IL **\$10,000**
Latet – Israeli Humanitarian Aid

The SHEF-IL project is an incredibly involved process, coordinating with the municipality, social workers and other organizations to understand the needs of the Holocaust survivors in Ashkelon and how to best provide support. This is the only program in Israel that aids Holocaust survivors by providing holistic care, such as a monthly food box, in-house emergency and medical care, home repairs and volunteers to relieve loneliness.

Soccer for Children with Disabilities **\$10,000**
Ilay Association

The Ilay Association operates soccer teams that are appropriate for the age and rate of development of children with disabilities. During training, the children learn the rules of the game, practice, play and strengthen themselves socially, emotionally and physically, through fun sports activities. Currently there are 30 Ashkelonian children and teens participating in the program, ages 10-20 divided into two soccer teams.

SPACE Scholastic Assistance Program in Ashkelon **\$20,000**
Ethiopian National Project

The School Performance and Community Empowerment (SPACE) Scholastic Assistance Program provides supplementary hours of educational support and individualized academic assessments, along with a holistic set of additional extra-curricular activities, workshops and nutritious meals to over 360 students in Ashkelon.

Therapeutic Family Group Homes for Ashkelon's Children and Youth at Risk **\$8,000**
Orr Shalom

Orr Shalom serves at-risk abused and neglected youth who are removed from their homes by Israeli Social Welfare. A comprehensive staff of social workers and psychologists work to provide these youth with a safe and loving environment in a unique model of group homes in Ashkelon.

Youth of Light Ashkelon **\$10,000**
Patrizio Paoletti Foundation for Development in Israel/Meitar

Youth of Light trains youth-at-risk attending the Meitar Community Center to facilitate candle-making workshops for visiting groups, including visitors from Baltimore. By running these workshops and teaching others, the teens gain self-confidence and a personal sense of accomplishment.

Building Global Community

Or Haner **\$20,000**

Or Haner has 37 years of experience strengthening the Jewish identity of teens across Latin America. This camp experience provides them with a safe place to have fun while exploring their Jewish heritage and creating connections with the Baltimore community. Upon their return, alumni are encouraged to take active roles to ensure the continuity of their communities.

Inter-Agency Task Force on Israeli Arab Issues **\$5,000**

The Inter-Agency Task Force on Israeli Arab Issues, a coalition of North American Jewish organizations, foundations and private philanthropists, are committed to the welfare of Israel and support the Jewish state's right to a secure and peaceful existence. The Task Force also partners with The Associated's Insight Israel Forum.

SUPPORTING A STRONG JEWISH COMMUNITY IN ODESA

The Associated has proudly partnered with the Odesa Jewish community for over 30 years. Through the Baltimore-Odesa Partnership, Baltimore community members have connected to peers in Odesa – and together we have seen the celebration of Jewish life in Odesa. While the war continues to bring crisis to Ukraine, our personal connections are strengthened through the care, communication and assistance shown by individuals in both communities.

Annual funding has been provided to support programming in the following areas for FY24:

Moishe House Odesa \$10,000

Supports educational and social programming for the young adult Jewish community in Odesa.

Overnight Camps (The Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI)) \$10,000

Professional training for counselors to work with traumatized immigrant youngsters in the camp setting.

Elderly Welfare in Odesa (The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC)) \$10,000

Provides vital aid to impoverished elderly Jews, including food, medicine, homecare, and relief against the harsh Ukrainian winters.

PJ Library \$10,000

Translates and provides Ukrainian language books to families in Odesa, as well as those families who have been displaced.

ORT Odesa School #94 \$10,000

The World ORT Jabotinsky Jewish School in Odesa has earned an outstanding reputation for strong secular education, paired with Jewish education, attracting students who otherwise would not attend a Jewish school.

Since the beginning of the war in 2022, emergency funds were granted to the organizations below to support Ukraine and the Odesa Jewish community (FY22, FY23 and FY24 grants included).

Camp Ramah Yachad \$21,500

Provides a respite and a Jewish camp experience for campers from Odesa who have experienced the trauma of war in summer of 2022 and summer 2023.

Emergency Volunteer Project \$12,500

Deployment of EVP firefighters to organize and implement rescue/recovery teams to search the ruins of destroyed buildings for survivors and those who have perished.

Hillel Odesa \$2,172

Affords fuel for generator for 5 months and blankets so that students can safely use the Hillel space throughout the winter.

Israel Trauma Coalition \$20,000

Provides trauma-focused therapy and emotional first-aid training

Magen David Adom \$10,000

Providing transportation from Israel including an armored ambulance, protective gear for paramedics and necessary medical supplies.

Moishe House Odesa \$15,991

Maintains housing and salary for employees as well as sleeping bags, blankets, emergency lamps and head lamps to allow community members to safely use the space.

Tikva Children's Home \$20,000

Provides kosher food and essential supplies for residents and staff of Tikva Children's Home. Also provides evacuation and security for residents and staff.

The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC) \$481,000

Securing and providing transportation to safe housing for displaced Jews, increasing cash assistance to elderly and families due to economic turmoil and staffing emergency hotlines to ensure the safety of Jews both remaining in Odesa and those who made the choice to leave.

The Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI) \$473,500

Mental health support for children, teens and local Ukrainian staff who will be participating in The Jewish Agency's summer and seasonal camping program (to be held in neighboring Baltic countries). Providing transport, support and financial assistance to Aliyah candidates as well as emergency accommodation and security for local community organizations.

ORT School Odesa \$21,662

Provides generator, oil, fuel and other rechargeable items so that teachers could virtually teach from the school despite the lack of power. Safeguarding Hebrew studies and Jewish activities at ORT schools in Ukraine through covering the cost of compensating teachers for additional hours to ensure that students are able to continue to benefit from uninterrupted classes.

ZAKA: Search and Rescue \$10,000

Support in the areas of rescue, recovery and treating the wounded.
