




San Francisco



Duration of Interventions and Excess Mortality



452 Deaths per 100,000






St. Louis

St. Louis had strong social distancing measures and a low total death rate. The city successfully delayed its peak in deaths, but faced a sharp increase when restrictions were temporarily relaxed.

- Duration needs to be early and long enough to cover peak and trough but not too long (to balance portion of population infected in first wave vs. susceptible to second wave)
- Some middle ground exists in duration of interventions to balance first wave and second wave magnitudes and risk
- Data from 1918 suggests that middle ground was somewhere between 60-120 days depending on the city
- Caveats: Flu is not COVID; City level compliance with interventions in 1918 is unknown; Changes in society since 1918 are dramatic

I know I'm going to receive a lot of flack for posting this. Some might even call me a snowflake.

Today I cried. The stress of coming to work everyday to a hospital caring for COVID patients, that has essentially shut down its services, that, believe it or not is also losing money everyday and trying to figure out what it is going to look like after when we get through this. This hospital that is paying 15x the usual cost for PPE to keep its staff safe while doing everything it can to care for your very, very sick loved one.

To see this - traffic blocking the main intersection of a level 1 trauma center, blocking the entrance and exit to our hospital. Blocking patients from receiving care that they need, makes me angry. It hurts. It hurts a lot.

This is not the government's fault. This is your fault. If you could swallow your pride and stay home like you were asked from the beginning, there wouldn't have been tougher guidelines.

Michiganders are strong. Michiganders are smart. Michiganders have grit. Michiganders are kind. We will get through this together.
